Apple Tree are continuing to learn all about traditional tales and stories. We enjoyed retelling the story of the Three Little Pigs using playdough and using our scissor skills to make hair for Goldilocks from beautiful flowers.

We all visited the immersive room to visit the Three Bears cottage - you'll never believe what we found inside! For

maths, we have been practising positional language with Concept Cat, finding objects inside, next to, in front and behind. Outside we collaborated on an artwork using paint and pipettes, exploring how the liquid moved and how we could make different colours.











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Reception: The children have loved learning about space and being curious about what is in the solar system. We have a space centre to report on missions to the moon and help astronauts floating in space! Our story this week has been 'How to Catch a Star' and the children had fantastic ideas of how they would catch a star and explored using different materials to build towers, ladders, skyscrapers and trampolines to get them closer to the stars.

Instead of going for a welly walk, we pretended to be astronauts going on a mission to the moon, so put on our space suits, space boots and went on a 'moon walk' for the afternoon.

In maths, Ash tree and Oak tree have been trying really hard to challenge themselves and be ambitious, working out all the different ways to make 7 - we even wrote number sentences whilst we were playing bowling.









KS1 The last few weeks have been busy for Year 1, we have looked at being explorers and experienced how it feels to discover things and why explorers are important. We have also looked at how technology can be used safely to enhance our learning during 'Internet Safety Week'. We have been a very curious and adventurous bunch this term!







In Year 2 we have been learning about fractions this week. The children have enjoyed being outside identifying a half, a quarter and a third and then finding fractions of quantities.



We have also been taking part in our first visits to the Badbury Park Library. The children loved every minute. They learnt how a library works, enjoyed a story and had a look at all of the wonderful books on the shelves. Each class will be visiting the library every term and will be able to borrow up to 30 books at a time to enjoy in class.

KS2 In Year 3, we have been enjoying our forest school sessions and have enjoyed linking this to our Stone Age topic. Some of us had a trip to the library where we learnt about the library system and were able to loan a whole class set of books! In maths, we have moved on to fractions and have been comparing and ordering unit and non-unit fractions. In English, we have been looking at newspaper reports and are looking forward to writing our own next week!







Year 4 have had an amazing fortnight. They have been very busy using the outdoors in their curriculum. In RE the children created 'I Am' sayings on the playground to reflect how they see themselves, much in the way Jesus saw himself. Some wrote, "I am the football player," others, "I am the carer," and "I am the life. I show kindness

and life—find me." Mrs T and Mrs Christmas were lost for words. Wow! Throughout English, Year 4 have used outdoor learning to build storytelling props to support their innovated stories based on the folk tale How Rabbit Stole the Fire. Finally, we had the best

journey to and from swimming this week as we were provided with STFC's team coach and sang our hearts out to Disney songs and Sweet Caroline.

In one of our first newsletters of the year (15th September), we advised that we had started working in partnership with the Swindon Borough Council Traffic Management and Road Safety team and Ward Councillors to address safety concerns outside the school gates on Rainscombe Road.


As a result of this work, the Council are proposing to introduce a school street initiative and parking restrictions on a section of

SBC will introduce an experimental traffic regulation order (ETRO) just after Easter which will be in place for 18 months. A consultation with parents, staff and residents will start once it is introduced on the street and run for 6 months during which time feedback will be collated by SBC. The ETRO will be reviewed after the first 6 months in light of the feedback and decision will be made by SBC as to whether to create a per-



What does this mean for parents?

manent traffic regulation order.

- Pupils, parents and local residents will experience a safer environment for walking and cycling to school
- Rainscombe road will be closed to all vehicles (apart from residents and blue badge holders) from 08.15am-09.00am and 2.30pm-3.15pm
- The area will be patrolled by SBC and school staff who will check permits
- Anyone who drives into the School Street during the restricted times, who does not have a
 permit will be in contravention of the Traffic Regulation Order and may be subject to a Fixed
 Penalty Notice issued by the Police.
- Parking will no longer be available at the front of the school during drop off and pick up times unless you are a blue badge holder. If you still need to drive to school, we ask that you park a short distance away and walk the rest of your journey

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

Guidance on measles outbreaks

Cases of measles are rising across England, especially among young children. Measles is an infection that spreads very easily among those who are unvaccinated, especially in nurseries and schools and there is no specific medical treatment; for some people the infection can cause serious complications.

What are the symptoms of measles? Measles usually starts with cold-like symptoms, followed by a rash a few days later. Symptoms include a runny nose; cough; conjunctivitis (sore, itchy, watery, red and sticky eyes); and a high temperature. Small white spots may also appear inside the cheeks and on the back of the lips. Around day 3 of the illness, a rash of flat red or brown blotches appear, beginning on the face, behind the ears and

spreading over the body. The rash looks brown or red on white skin. It may be harder to see on brown and black skin.



Answers to some common questions about measles and the MMR vaccine

Why are we seeing these outbreaks of measles?

Measles is a highly infectious disease, spreading quickly from person to person, especially in schools. A child with measles will infect almost all unprotected children they have contact with. Since the end of 2017 there has been an increase in measles globally which has affected the UK. This has resulted in some spread into wider communities, in particular in undervaccinated groups.

When are the MMR vaccinations usually given?

The best times are between 12 and 13 months of age and again at 3 years and 4 months, with one dose on each occasion. But, if your child wasn't vaccinated then, they can be vaccinated at any age with 2 doses one month apart.

Will there be any side effects to the vaccination?

Your child may get the symptoms of measles, mumps and rubella for up to 6 weeks after the vaccination but in a very much milder form. This proves that the vaccine is working and your child is building up resistance to future contact with the viruses that cause the 3 diseases. Not all children show these symptoms but that doesn't mean the vaccine isn't working.

Should parents in outbreak areas get vaccinated against measles?

As with many diseases, once you have had measles, you don't catch it again because you have built up a natural resistance to it. So, if you've had measles or 2 doses of MMR vaccine you do not need to get vaccinated now.

The best protection against measles for children and adults is to get both doses of the MMR vaccine. The MMR vaccine is free on the NHS. Children are offered the vaccine by their GP at 12 months of age and then a second booster dose is offered to children when they turn 3-years-and-4-months-old. Uptake of the MMR vaccine has been declining nationally and in Swindon but it is never too late to have these vaccinations.
