Year 1/Year 2:



In Beech Tree class we have been learning about Islands in Geography. We made our own islands and labelled them with human and physical geographical features. The British Isles is made up of many Islands and we have enjoyed reading Katie Morag Deliver the Mail set on a Scottish Island.





In Yew and Pine Tree class we have been working hard on our DT projects. In Year 1 we have learnt about windmills and planned, made and evaluated our own, using paper to

create the turbine. In Year 2, we have learnt how to make wheels and how a wheel turns on an axel. We used this knowledge to design, make and evaluate our own Ferris wheels in groups. The children worked extremely well as a team and adapted their plans to address specific design



criteria. They are very proud what they have achieved and so are we!

Year 3: As part of our Year 3 finale, we have been researching the evolution of homes in the UK, focussing on Iron Age, Roman, Tudor and Victorian homes. The children have used iPads to find out facts



about when and how these types of homes were built, materials used to make them and their unique qualities. As part of our exploration of the UK, the children have used atlases to explore different regions. In Science, we have begun looking at Light and how this impacts the world we live in. We will be investigating how shadows are made and the different types. In Maths, we have looked at time, hour and minute hands and digital



conversions. We will finish the year by looking at statistics using bar charts, pictograms and data. This has been a fantastic year for Maple Tree Class and we are incredibly proud of every child's achievements this year; the hard work and effort is truly recognised. Next week, we cannot wait to cap the year off in style with the Y3 Production - Eruption! The Story of the Stone Age and Romans. We look forward to welcoming you next Wednesday at 2pm.

Staff from Badbury Park Library came to our school this week to talk about joining the library and the Summer Reading Challenge—Ready, Set, Read!



How to take part:

- Children sign up at the library to start their challenge, picking up their Ready, Set, Read! collector folder.
- Borrow books and get reading! Children choose the books they want to read, recording what they have read
 on their folder. Library staff and volunteers are on hand to chat to children about books they have read.
- For every book read, children will pick up stickers along with other rewards. They'll also help the Ready, Set, Read! team weave through the obstacle course.
- Every child who completes the challenge, by reading 6 library books, receives a medal and certificate.

This is a **free** activity for children but they will need their own library card and need to be accompanied by an adult. The Library will also be running family events every Thursday during the holidays, details will appear shortly on the library webpage <u>www.southswindon-pc.gov.uk</u>





Stay Safe around water this summer

Water claims the lives of more than 50 children a year in the UK. Drowning is among the leading causes of accidental death. Under-estimating the dangers of water can have tragic consequences. You may be able to swim well in a warm indoor pool, but that does not mean you will be able to swim in cold water.

The key to staying safe is making the right choices to avoid getting into difficulty in the first place.

Here are some top tips for staying safe around water:

Take notice of safety information, warning signs and flags. Younger children may not recognise the dangers, and need to be supervised by an adult.

To not jump or dive into rivers. Quick entry into cold water can cause your body to go into shock. Also it's difficult to judge the depth just by looking, there can be submerged dangers such as weed or rubbish.

Be aware of strong currents and don't go into water near locks, weirs, sluices, bridges and pipes as these structures are often linked with strong currents.

The water in rivers and lakes can be colder than you expect at any time of the year. Cold water shock will affect your ability to swim, look after yourself, or rescue others. It's a key reason why many people drown.

Airbeds, inner tubes and other flotation devices can easily be carried or blown in to deep water and may not keep you afloat.


Safety information—Car seat laws in the UK

Children in cars, vans and other vehicles must be carried in an appropriate child restraint from birth until either they are **135cm (4'5'') tall or 12 years old**, whichever comes first. They must then use a seat belt.

Children under 3 years must use an appropriate child restraint in the front or rear of a vehicle. They cannot be carried in a car that does not have seat belts because it is not possible to fit a child restraint in such a vehicle. It is illegal to carry a child in a rearward-facing child seat in the front if there is an active front passenger airbag. The airbag must be deactivated or the rearward-facing child seat must be placed in the rear.

Children aged 3 years to 135cm tall (approx 4'5") who are under 12 years must use an appropriate child restraint when travelling in the front seat of a car, van or other goods vehicle. They must use an appropriate child restraint when travelling in the rear, if seat belts are fitted.

TOP ACTIVITIES

- Enjoy a picnic on the trail. Can you talk about what to pack and make it together?
- Collect treasures. Take a bag or bucket to collect treasures on the trail (or if you forget, pockets will do). When you get home display them and let your child talk about what they found or show some-one else.
- Take pictures- collect pictures and put together a memory book, talk about the adventures you had on the trail. Older kids could write things down too.
- Draw or model your own dog either at home or out and about, in the mud with a stick. Can you decorate it with interesting things e.g. leaves, flowers?
- <u>Balloon dogs</u>- a few spare balloons? make your own balloon dog.
- Cloud watching- lie down and watch the clouds, talk about the shapes and colours.



Walk and Jalk

- Follow your child's lead. Slow down, get on their level, stop and talk about what they find interesting (This might be a big dog or it might be an ant climbing up it's leg).
- Comment on what your child sees, hears or does e.g. 'Wow big dog' 'A pretty flower'
- Expand. If your child says 'dog' you can add more information 'yes a big dog' or
- 'wow a colourful dog'
- Repeat say words over and over again
 Take turns: let your child have a turn, this
- Take turns, let your child have a turn, this could be talking, using pictures, getsures or noises. Accept all attempts to communicate as a 'turn'

LET'S TALK Swindogs

Being able to communicate is one of the most important skills we ever learn. It helps us be a part of the world around us, to develop, to say how we feel and build relationships.

We also know that being outdoors is really important for children's speech and language development.

We've put together some of our favourite ideas to get Swindon talking on the Big Dog Art Trail.

Songs & Rhyme

Experts in child development have discovered that if a child knows eight nursery rhymes off by heart by the time they are 4 years old, they're usually among the best readers by the the time they are 8!

- Sing songs together on the trail: • <u>Where has my little dog gone?</u>
- Where has my little dog gon
 B-I-N-G-O
- How much is that doggy in the window?
 Hey Diddle, Diddle

You can change words in songs to make it more fun e.g. Where has my big dog gone?

Or perhaps use Michael Rosen's <u>Bear hunt t</u>o make up your own rhyme
